




## Dear Friends,

Policies like the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and Medicaid provide critical safeguards against discrimination and ensure access to necessary services. Without robust policies in place, people with disabilities could face increased barriers to healthcare, employment, and community inclusion.

We cannot stand by and allow any additional funding cuts to Medicaid. That is why we are calling on you, our valued supporters, to act. **Your voice matters, and together, we can and will make a difference.**

But Lindsaylee was not lacking ability—she just learned




"I have to prove myself every single time," she admits. "But it also gives people the opportunity to see that not everybody learns the same way. Just because I learn differently does not mean I do not have value."
